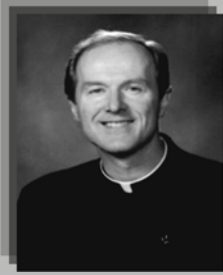

■ FROM THE PASTOR



Dear Parishioners:

As Catholics we are required by our faith to be fully involved as citizens in this country. On November 6, the day of elections, we should make every effort to inform ourselves of the positions of various candidates and vote with an informed conscience. I have listed several points from a document entitled Faithful Citizenship by our American Bishops. I hope you will find some of these points helpful.

As a nation we share many blessings and strengths, including a tradition of religious freedom and political participation. However, as a people we face serious challenges that are both political and moral. This has always been so and as Catholics we are called to participate in public life in a manner consistent with the mission of our Lord, a mission that He has called us to share.

The Church does not tell Catholics how to vote, but serious Christians often face difficult choices about how to vote. This is why it is so important to vote according to a well-formed conscience that perceives the proper relationship among moral goods. A Catholic cannot vote for a candidate who favors a policy promoting an intrinsically evil act, such as abortion, racist behavior, euthanasia, assisted suicide, deliberately subjecting workers or the poor to subhuman living conditions, or redefining marriage in ways that violate its essential meaning if the voter's intent is to support that position.

There may be times when a Catholic who rejects a candidate's unacceptable position even on policies promoting an intrinsically evil act may reasonably decide to vote for that candidate for other morally grave reasons. Voting in this way would be permissible only for truly grave moral reasons, not to advance narrow interest or partisan preferences or to ignore a fundamental evil.

When all candidates hold a position that promotes an intrinsically evil act, the conscientious voter faces a dilemma. The voter may decide to take the extraordinary step of not voting for any candidate or, after careful deliberation, may decide to vote for the candidate deemed less likely to advance such a morally flawed position and more likely to pursue other authentic human goods.

"FULLY ALIVE AS MISSIONARY DISCIPLES"

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives us the two great commandments -- First, you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. Second, you shall love your neighbor as yourself. These commandments not only encompass all 10 commandments given to Moses, they also encompass Stewardship, as we define it in our diocese. To be "fully alive as missionary disciples" requires us to recognize and receive God's gifts and to share those gifts in love of God and neighbor. Whether you proclaim God's word as a lector, hold a regular hour of Adoration, serve on a committee, volunteer in a classroom, or serve your elderly parents, visit a sick neighbor, or even participate in the election process as a citizen, you are practicing Stewardship. When you do these things out of love (rather than obligation), you are showing your dedication God and your neighbor. The scribe in today's reading understood that love for God and neighbor is worth more than all the burnt offerings and sacrifices man could offer. Clearly love is key to discipleship.
